Submission Guidelines for The Principal

Many of you are already aware that I use rather antiquated software to assemble, typeset, and print this newsletter (and we all know that "old" does not mean "inferior," or we wouldn't be playing the organ). But it does mean that certain modern formats are difficult for me to deal with.

In particular, DOC and DOCX files are the most difficult, since I have almost nothing at home that can deal with them easily, or even render them faithfully.

RTF (Rich Text Format), on the other hand, is something that nearly every modern word processor can produce, and it's very easy for me to deal with. Another good choice would be a plain ASCII or UTF-8 text file, or the body of a plain text email.

And remember: if you have an event, we want to be able to get the word out in time to make a difference. The industry standard for monthly periodicals is to have them in the mail by the beginning of the month, and that's what I try to do.

Oh, and if I talk about column-inches, and you're not sure what I mean, well, it's exactly what it sounds like: Merriam-Webster defines a column-inch as "a unit of measure for printed matter one column wide and one inch deep," and Oxford defines it as "A one-inch length of a column in a newspaper or magazine."

Lamentations on a Mess

First, the remainder of the 2019-2020 Disney Hall season was canceled, eliminating performances by Monica Czausz, Boston Baroque, and Les Violins du Roy. Then everything planned for my Spring vacation evaporated in a puff of COVID-19-contaminated

breath, although some of what I would be missing is already rescheduled for 2021.

Then the Hollywood Bowl season was canceled, and I went from perhaps as many as 18 concerts over the 10-week summer season to having nothing but my small archive of broadcast concerts.

Then I got word that the new Disney Hall season would be canceled through the end of 2020.

There are clerics and church musicians I haven't seen face-to-face in months, and some I haven't even seen online. And it's been five months since my last organ lesson.

At the Printing Museum, we haven't been open for normal operations for months. But at least there, we've actually had things to do during the enforced downtime, mostly things we couldn't have accomplished without it: the new wing finally got permanent wiring, and a floor that wasn't the divot-riddled bare concrete our tenant had left us with. But I've only been able to do Linotype demos for a few contractors, and some very tightly controlled special events, and even then, doing it behind a mask, and choking on my own steam.

But it hasn't been all bad: I finally found the time to start writing a new draft of the novel that first led me to begin organ lessons. And I've been able, through the wonders of live-streaming and YouTube, to attend churches I've only ever been able to attend while on vacation, including St. Stephen Lutheran of Williamsburg, VA and Transfiguration Episcopal (New York City's famous "Little Church Around the Corner"), all from the comfort of my office (in a completely empty building, obviating any need for a mask). And I expect that as long as those churches continue to have online services, I will continue to join them with some regularity, even after I resume attending in-person services.

And perhaps that is the biggest positive lesson of the COVID-19 Pandemic: that we can still gather together in spirit, even while physically isolated, fully participating in ways that, under the present circumstances, would be suicidal if we did so in person. While I'm having trouble even imagining how some of our virtual events will play out, the schedule does look intriguing.
